An unexpected voice from France

Wednesday, November 18, 2015

A few days ago while I and the rest of the world, were reeling from the horrific events in Paris, I received a surprise email from a stranger.

As some of my spark friends know, my travels include walking in the footsteps of my Dad, a sailor during WWII, who kept a diary and took many pictures.

From France, Alain wrote:

"On your blog www.brigs.us/Europe-Apr

-2015/index-LeHavre.htm I saw the pictures you took while visiting Le Havre in May 2015.

I am able to give you some information (I was a young boy in 1945, living in a destroyed Le Havre).

The picture taken inside a church was not precisely referenced, and you have tried to find this church. You visited Eglise Notre Dame (in the heart of Le Havre) and you have concluded the picture is not Notre-Dame Church. You are right. In fact the picture had been taken in Eglise Saint Francois (Saint-Francois church), 350 yards East of Notre Dame.

You missed it, as this church is slightly hidden past narrow streets. But you were very close, as it is 150 yards North of the small fish market you visited."

On Monday my DD (Hayburner1969) and I visited a nursing home. Our regular program includes scripture reading and reflection and a LOT of singing, not only hymns but also songs of their youth, especially the 1940s.

We reflected on the events in France and how the world seemed a very scary and dark place right now. However, they lived through a time of great evil before and they reminded me that in the end good did triumph.

Alain continued his comments on my blog and attached current pictures of Le Havre, locations that I just missed as I walked the city. War destroyed his city once, but it was rebuilt. Evil was defeated. We must believe that good will triumph again.

Note: I am not a pacifist. We must be vigilant and take the steps necessary to fight terrorists. However, we must take care not to condemn anyone just because they share a common heritage with the evildoers. Once we locked in internment camps those who had the same ethnicity as our attackers. Once we turned away refugees from the war and returned them to their eventual deaths. History now judges those WWII actions harshly.
