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My recent blogs about the Donna Reed Era have triggered one last memory

Where would I be if this hadn't happened?



I was almost 16 on June 2, 1963 and just finishing my Junior year of High School
It was my 3rd high school because of an unsettled family situation.

I was invited to a party in another neighborhood at the last minute by a girlfriend who didn't want to go alone. Joe was finishing his freshman year at Brooklyn Poly Tech. I didn't know what that was. He was studying Aerospace Engineering. I didn't know what that was either.

I mentioned in my last blog that I was the first of my family to attend college. Actually, none of my friends had college in their plans. The girls were all headed to one of the thousands of office jobs in NYC. I would be one of them.

By November we were "going steady" and Joe wondered why I wasn't going to college.

My grades were great. In fact, I was editing and typing HIS term papers.

Joe: How are your SATs?

Me: What are SATs?

The only colleges I knew were those playing football on TV or sometimes basketball.

No HS counselor even mentioned college as an option, but they registered me for the December SAT

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exam as I requested.

At that time the average SAT combined Language/Math score was just above 1000. 1200s were great. Mine came back over 1400. Yes, with no test preparation courses either. Suddenly I was on the guidance counselor's radar.

Oh yes, I was college material even with my lack of AP classes. Even though I had to attend summer school before my Junior year because of different graduation requirements in my 3rd high school

It was a bit late to apply for college and unlikely my parents would have accepted sending me off somewhere to live in a dorm. You lived at home until you got married. That's how it worked.

There was an option. The 4 campuses of the City University of New York were free to NYC residents. That was good. because the only loan my frugal family took was a mortgage. Tuition loan? Not gonna happen.

The CUNY required a B+ average and some SAT number that I easily exceeded and a March application deadline. OK, I will go to college.

The AHA moments we write about here usually involve changing our health direction, but I bet there are many who have experienced other similar life changing events as I did. Some for the better and some not so good.

If you have a similar story in one context or another, I am interested in hearing about it.

Throughout my life I have maintained an awareness of how many children never realized their potential because of their life circumstances. My son, who was aware of my story, sponsored a scholarship in my name (matched by his company) for girls of working class parents who wanted to study math or the sciences.

"A Mind is a Terrible Thing to Waste" is not just a phrase, but absolutely true.

I understand that times were different back when I came of age.
I am describing a time before many Sparkers here were even born.
My part time job at Woolworth's paid for my books and other expenses.
In the 90s we could send 3 kids to college for 5K each per year.
Now my granddaughter is paying 25K per year at the same state university.

I can still remember going to the local social security office at the age of 10 to get my SSN, so that we could then go to the savings and loan and open a savings account in my very own name. They did the same for my older brother, too.

My parents deposited \$10,000 in that account, a huge amount in 1968! We all knew it was for college only. I was so proud of that passbook! And I went to college, earning two degrees.

How could they deposit that much in 1968? Well, my mom grew our food, canned it, sewed our clothes, and helped my dad on the farm. We never went on a vacation, rarely ate in restaurants, we had one car, a 21-inch black and white TV, and on weekends we went to church or to visit nearby family for entertainment. I remember being embarrassed that my mom "patched" our wash clothes with flannel instead of buying new.

So I NEVER considered NOT going to college, because of their sacrifices. I have no greater heroes.

What a great story, I wonder if your parents initially were a bit not happy that you as a high school student were dating a college age boy. What an awesome help mate he was, recognizing your ability and encouraging you. What a great happily ever after you are enjoying !!

I love life journey stories, and enjoyed reading through the comments.

In my own case, I grew up on a farm and wanted to go to university, and what I was most interested in was agriculture. Most of my peers in that era were children of immigrants, mostly Dutch, whose parents came to Canada after the war as newly weds with less than \$50 in their pockets. They were good people, hard workers, successful farmers, and their kids were encouraged to leave school as soon as possible and work. When my good friend's brother John found out I wanted to go to university to study agriculture (I did get Bachelor of Science in Agriculture), he thought that was hilarious - I grew up on a farm, why would I have to go to university to learn about agriculture. When he and the rest of my peers had families, they encouraged them all to finish high school and John had a very bright daughter who also wanted to study agriculture (she did and works as a professional agrologist) and he encouraged her and was so proud of her. How times changed, in a good way. Anyway, back to my story. My dad came from a middle class family, he was an engineer, one of his sisters was a journalist and one was a medical doctor (born in 1916, went to med school in the '30s, one of 20 women in a class of 200). My dad's family always encouraged their women and believed they had equal potential to men. My dad didn't like the middle class rat race and left Italy to become a farmer in Canada, to a more wholesome life in his opinion. Among my cousins and my family, all were expected to go to university and most rebelled against that notion. Among my 10 cousins and sibs, 4 finished university and they all could have gone if they wanted to. Their parents were disappointed. Lots of careers, for example, businessmen and trades men (and women) are not lacking anything in not having a university degree. Personally, I think working at what you love and earning enough to be self-sufficient is more important than having a university degree. Knowing how to learn, having a life you enjoy, earning enough to be self-sufficient, having good family relationships, giving back to your community are what I value. For sure having an university degree can be a good thing, but it isn't everything or the only good thing.

The person who changed the direction of my life is my husband. Getting married and having a family was not a main ambition for me. I liked working and pursuing my own interests. But I am very happy to have met him and to be sharing a life and family with him. It is fortunate when we find a partner that dovetails our interests and values. I did not expect to find that, we found each other, its all (well mostly all, can't completely claim perfection) so good.

He was working in a local grocery store when I was born and the meat cutter taught him the art of meat cutting. That enabled him to be hired as a civilian at the Air Force Base where we lived.
Dad never finished school but he was determined that his 7 children would! AND we all did!

When I applied to an RN hospital nursing course....the first thing that happened was one mark from school came back not high enough for me to gain entrance (history! oh how I hated history) My Dad who was usually a shy man...checked out some things....came home one day and told me I was going to call this local Senator who was on the hospital board & I was going to tell him how much I wanted to be a nurse & why I was not able to go to take the course (that miserable history mark!
